### **Rationale**

Strengthening the governance of climate finance through climate budgeting and planning and unlocking innovative sources of finance can pave the way for a climate-resilient future and green recovery while solving longstanding gender inequality problems, multidimensional forms of poverty and various forms of social injustice.

#### **Background and institutional context**

The Climate Finance Network (**CFN**)<sup>1</sup> builds on UNDP's Strengthening the Governance of Climate Change Finance (**GCCF**) programme, which worked to mainstream climate considerations into national budgets, with the support of SIDA and DFID since 2012. The goal of the CFN is that Governments in Asia and the Pacific mobilize and manage increased climate finance to combat climate change effectively while promoting gender equality, human rights, and poverty reduction leading to the implementation of the 2030 Agenda.

This workshop follows a number of recent events organized around the intersection of gender, sustainable finance and/or climate action space.<sup>2</sup> This one has an added emphasis on **gender equality and innovative climate finance**.

This event is hosted by the Ministry Of Women Empowerment And Child Protection Of The Republic Of Indonesia and the Ministry of Finance of Indonesia and convened under the auspices of the Gender and Social Inclusion (GSI) Expert Reference Group of the CFN, co-chaired by UNWOMEN and UNDP, striving to building policy consensus at regional and international forums on inclusion of gender and social inclusion in climate change finance and promoting gender-responsive climate investment and projects, knowledge products and tools and methodologies.

# **Objectives and expected outcomes**

The objective of the workshop is to contribute to peer-to-peer learning for all relevant stakeholders in the discussions related to how to advance innovative and gender-responsive climate change financing processes and interventions and chart a way forward for better collaboration and greater effectiveness to enhance impacts. This workshop, presented as a multi-stakeholder and participatory learning event aims to provide an opportunity to share experiences and ideas and gain knowledge and evidence across this complex topic, relevant to specific contexts and levels (national and subnational), and allowing to scale up and improve the effectiveness and tangible impact of efforts over time.

#### The workshop will aim to:

- Present country experiences to highlight entry points for better prioritization of climate finance budgeting that
  have traceable social inclusion, gender equality and poverty reduction co-benefits, including integrating various
  tools in budgetary systems and processes
- Explore the role of innovative financial mechanisms in unlocking gender-responsive and socially inclusive CC finance
- Identify solutions for coordination and policy alignment across central, thematic and sub-national levels of government, integrated into sectoral and local systems and actions and capacity challenges, adequate M&E frameworks
- Discuss the **role of CSOs, oversight institutions** and Parliamentary Committees have potential to promote traceability and accountability over inclusive and gender-responsive CC finance
- Critically discuss the role of the GSI Reference Group and reinvigorate its network

### **Target audience and participants**

- Country stakeholders (policymakers)
- Climate Finance GSI Reference Group members, including development, research and civil society organizations
- Regional organizations: ADB, WOCAN, UNEP, CIFOR, ASEAN, etc.
